

## Proactive Grants

Proactive grants reflect the Health Trust's interest in developing integrated service models that improve health care access and delivery for Chicago's vulnerable populations. Through documentation and evaluation, the Health Trust aims to make the case for long-term public and private support of lessons learned from these models. Most projects are multi-year and include the elements of demonstration, evaluation, public policy advocacy, and dissemination.

The following initiatives were developed at the invitation of and in conjunction with the Health Trust. The Health Trust does not accept unsolicited proposals for Proactive grants. The list below shows Proactive grants continuing or approved during FY2006 and FY2007. 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### **Assessing Services for People with Disabilities, Their Families, and Care Givers** **\$10,000**

November 2006 through January 2007

Coordinating organization: Jewish Federation of Metropolitan Chicago

To complete an assessment and planning project defining services of Jewish Federation of Metropolitan Chicago agencies as well as service and funding gaps for people with disabilities, their families, and care-givers. The Jewish Federation and the Health Trust will use the results to guide future activities addressing the needs of people with disabilities, their families, and caregivers.

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### **Assuring Better Child Health and Development II (ABCD II)** **\$120,025**

January 2005 through December 2006

Coordinating organization: Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services

To enable Illinois to participate as one of five states in the ABCD II project sponsored by the Commonwealth Fund in New York, and to obtain technical assistance from the National Academy for State Health Policy. Objectives include refining and communicating Medicaid policy and implementing new policies to promote children's healthy mental development; increasing parents' awareness of children's development and social/emotional health; and evaluating activities to inform future policy and practice.

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### **Chicago Center for Jewish Genetic Disorders** **\$1,279,131**

July 1999 through June 2008

Coordinating organization: Jewish Federation of Metropolitan Chicago

Partner organizations: Children's Memorial Hospital and the Illinois Jewish Genetic Disorders Committee

The Center seeks to improve understanding of Jewish genetic disorders in the Chicago area. It provides information, referrals, screenings, and genetic counseling. The Center also does advocacy work, disseminates research findings, and educates health care professionals. A partnership of health care systems, respite facilities, and transitional and permanent housing providers, CHHP evaluated the impact of expedited hospital discharge, specialized case management, and housing on the health of chronically ill homeless adults and on health care costs. During the integration phase, the project team planned for integration of lessons learned into the delivery system of services for chronically homeless people; completed data collection and analysis; and continued to develop and implement dissemination activities.

The first grant supported projects of the Forum's Pediatric Patient Safety and Medication Safety task forces. The Pediatric Patient Safety project involves five health care providers and Northwestern University's Institute for Health Services Research and Policy Studies. The Medication Safety task force extended a project of the Illinois Hospital Association beyond the hospital setting into the community. The second two-year grant supports the Pediatric Patient Safety task force's initiatives to decrease errors related to unclear communications.

Coordinating organization: University of Illinois at Chicago

To support the work of Violence Interrupters in parts of Chicago experiencing the highest numbers of shootings and killings, and to support CeaseFire core staff activities in Chicago. Violence Interrupters hired and trained through this grant are intervening with Latino gangs concentrated in Chicago's Southwest and Brighton Park areas.

**Enhancing Developmentally Oriented Primary Care (continued)**

The partners developed a framework and structure for a multi-year project to improve the financing and delivery of health promotion and developmental services in primary health care settings for Chicago children under the age of three and their parents. The project seeks to expand: the delivery of comprehensive developmental and social/emotional assessments for children under three; timely screening and referral for maternal depression; appropriate child developmental and mental health referrals; and parent education.

<b>Health Care Issues Roundtable</b>	<b>\$180,000</b>
January 2005 through December 2007	

Each year 12 organizations receive a \$5,000 grant recognizing leadership in improving health care access and quality.

The Roundtable brings together health and social service policy advocates, providers, and government leaders to share information about new initiatives, discuss successes and barriers to improving health care access and quality, and help to shape future Proactive projects. All participants are working on projects or programs funded by the Health Trust and have several years of proven leadership in Chicago's health care community.

<b>Healthy Births for Healthy Communities: Interconceptual Care Component</b>	<b>\$305,000</b>
January 2007 through December 2009	

Coordinating organization: Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services

In North Lawndale and Austin, infant mortality rates are 70 to 80 percent higher than for Chicago as a whole. The grant supports implementation of an interconceptual care program to promote at least an 18-month interval between births for postpartum women at highest risk. Strategies include expanded case management and outreach to pregnant women who were not enrolled in services during their previous pregnancy.

<b>Improving Access to Health and Mental Health Care for Chicago's Deaf Community</b>	<b>\$700,735</b>

Coordinating organizations: Advocate Health Care and Sinai Health System

Phase I involved face-to-face interviews in American Sign Language (ASL) with 203 deaf participants regarding their health status, health care experiences, communication styles, and barriers to accessing health care. In Phase II, a demonstration project evaluated the effectiveness of health education to prevent cardiovascular disease and promote self-management of depression in Chicago's Deaf community.

**Make Medicare Work Coalition** **\$900,000**

January 2005 through December 2007

Coordinating organizations: Health & Disability Advocates; AgeOptions (formerly Suburban Area Agency on Aging); Progress Center for Independent Living

This project is a planned and organized response in Illinois to the Medicare Prescription Drug Modernization and Improvement Act of 2003 (MMA). Grants allow each agency to increase staffing and partnerships to enhance advocacy, outreach, education, and enrollment in the Medicare drug program. **Michael Reese Health Trust Partnership with the Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services (HFS)** **\$800,000**

To enable HFS (formerly the Illinois Department of Public Aid) to design, implement, and evaluate pilot projects to reduce negative birth outcomes and improve children's oral health, in partnership with other state agencies, community groups, universities, and health care providers. The partnership uses Medicaid and other data from a variety of public sources as part of project development and evaluation and leverages federal Medicaid matching dollars to obtain additional resources for demonstration projects.

**School-based Demonstration Project to Lower Childhood Obesity** **\$200,000**

July 2006 through June 2008

Coordinating organizations: Sinai Health System and Jewish Federation of Metropolitan Chicago

To implement and evaluate a school-based obesity demonstration project in two Associated Talmud Torah primary schools in the East Rogers Park and Peterson Park communities. Goals are to lower levels of obesity among 630 children in grades K-8 and develop a replicable model that can be disseminated more broadly. The project recognizes dietary, behavioral, and belief systems that are unique to the Jewish population in the targeted schools.

Initial support established SUHI and provided research, evaluation, counsel, and technical assistance to the Proactive Grants Program. Subsequent grants have supported ongoing consultation on the Proactive Grants Program's evaluation components; dissemination of Health Trust project results; a three-year evaluation of the Health Trust-supported project "Improving Access to Health and Mental Health Care for Chicago's Deaf Community"; and enhancement of SUHI's grant development capabilities. ## Grantmaking Guidelines

The primary focus of the Michael Reese Health Trust is to improve the health status of vulnerable populations in the Chicago metropolitan area. The Health Trust is committed to supporting community-based health education and health services that are accessible, affordable, and culturally and linguistically competent. We are especially interested in efforts to address the barriers that prevent vulnerable groups from accessing quality health care, and in programs that deliver comprehensive, coordinated services.

We recognize that improving the health of vulnerable groups requires more than offering quality health care. Effective grantmaking must address the complex range of social, economic, and environmental factors that shape a community's health and well-being. To this end, the Health Trust supports efforts to document effective delivery models and implementation strategies, as well as projects aimed at achieving lasting, systemic change.

### Target Populations

The Health Trust addresses the health concerns of the most vulnerable members of society, particularly those who are isolated by poverty, race or ethnicity, language, culture, and other factors that make them difficult to reach.

Our target populations include:

- Children and youth
- People with mental and physical disabilities
- The elderly
- Immigrants and refugees
- Uninsured, medically indigent, and other underserved populations

To emphasize the Health Trust's Jewish heritage, we give special consideration to programs that serve members of the Jewish community who fall within these populations.

### Types of Support

The Health Trust will entertain requests for both general and project support. We will consider both one-year and multi-year requests. Examples include:

- Increasing access to health services
- Improving coordination of health services
- Innovative approaches to delivering community-based health services
- Services to improve community health through health promotion and disease prevention
- Evaluation to strengthen the knowledge base underlying improvements in health and health care
- Education to improve the ability of health care providers to treat targeted populations
- Policy analysis of health issues affecting target populations
- Advocacy to improve health care systems for vulnerable groups
- Health workforce development that addresses the needs of vulnerable populations
- Planning grants to strengthen programs or organizations

The Health Trust does not make grants for:

- Capital needs, such as buildings, renovations, vehicles, and equipment
- Endowment
- Fundraising events, including sponsorship, tickets, and advertising
- Debt reduction
- Individual and scholarship support

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
